Safety Officer's Report

Check the Weather

This is a big safety tip. Make sure you familiarize yourself with the area in which you will be boating and thoroughly check the weather beforehand, so you're prepared for any type of situation. Be sure to wear a life jacket.

Plan Ahead and File a Float Plan

Always tell someone where you'll be on the water. It's very important to communicate with friends and family where you will be boating, what time you will be leaving and what time you're planning to return.

Leave Alcohol Ashore

Remember that alcohol has an impairing effect on coordination that can put a captain and passengers at risk of falling overboard. Operating a boat while drinking also could lead to a boating under the influence charge, which carries steep fines.

Dress for the Weather Conditions

To begin with dress in layers, starting with a thin base layer, and avoid clothing items like blue jeans and cotton shirts, because these items do not dry as easily or retain heat as well as wool and synthetic materials. It's also a good idea to bring along a separate bag of heavier clothing in case the weather deteriorates.

Check Your Boat

This is very important before heading out. Check your bilge for excessive water, gas and oil leaks. Do not take chances, do any necessary repairs before departing. Run your bilge blower for four minutes and check the exhaust side for fuel fumes. Start the engine to check for smooth running and proper cooling water discharge. Make sure your navigation lights and communication equipment are proper working order.

Enjoy the Day on the Lake

Most of all, have a great day of boating and enjoy the Fall weather. Be alert of your surroundings and boating traffic near you.

This year, who knows? Florida is struck most often, but every coastal state is a potential target.

Experts predict that in the next 20 years there will be much more hurricane activity than has been seen in the past 20 years. Experts also fear that after several storm-free years, people in some of the vulnerable areas will be less wary of a storm's potential fury. But to residents of Charleston, South Carolina, crippled by Hugo in 1989, and people in Dade County, Florida, ravaged by Andrew in 1993, the hurricane threat won't soon be forgotten.

LMPS supports the 20th Annual Dam Swim for Drew

Each year LMPS members use their boats to line the race course and keep swimmers safe. We also help set up the swim course across Lake Murray. This year, the 20th Annual Dam Swim for Drew was held on Saturday 8 September. The sun was out and winds were light and we could not have asked for better weather for this year's race. 262 swimmers participated with the fastest time being 41:19. Only one swimmer decided they could not complete the two-mile swim and boarded one of our boats. In addition to many South Carolina swimmers, we had swimmers from as far as GA, MD, PA, AL, NC and CT.

The annual event raises awareness of boating and swimming safety in memory of 10-year old Drew Smith who on 19 July 1997 was killed in a boating accident when a group of boaters made the decision to drink and drive on Lake Murray. Shortly after the accident, the South Carolina Legislature voted on legislation for "Boating Under the Influence (BUI)" and SC Code 50-21-112 soon became known as "Drew's Law." This legislation raised the penalties for boating violations to equal that of similar highway violations, most notably that of death resulting from BUI (Boating Under the Influence).


